* Life Connections—explain specifically how a piece of the text connects to something personal.

* Real World Connections—explain specifically how a piece of the text connects to something from the real world, current or historical.

* Explanation of the author's use of a chosen literary device.

* Thesis of choice—devoted to a thesis of the student's choosing.




Character's Diary—Imagine you are a character in the book. You do not have to select the main character. Write at least five diary entries (minimum of ½ page each) that this character might have made concerning the events that take place throughout the novel.

Interview—Write a minimum two page interview between you and a main character of the text. Your interview should explore questions that you wondered about during your reading, and the answers should show your understanding of the character being interviewed. Be sure that both questions and answers demonstrate deep thinking and an understanding of the content of the novel.


Double-Entry Journal—As you read, choose ten passages from the text (be sure to include passages that span the book) and place them on the left hand side of the paper. Include the page number. On the right hand side of each passage, write a one-paragraph response to that passage.

Reaction Paper—Write a minimum two page reaction paper to the text, explaining your thoughts on the text and whether or not you agree or disagree with the ideas the author presents.



Writing Assignment for Rising 10th, 11th, & 12th Grade students from the Required Reading

Writing Assignment:

Select three different journal prompts from the list on the back of brochure.

Type a one-page response for each of the three journal prompts using three different sections of the book.

Journal responses should be thesis based, devoted to one specific point.

Each response should incorporate at least one in-text citation.

The response should NOT include information from any sources outside of the book itself. Responses should not match any internet sources.

All three (3) journal pages are due on the first day of class.
